The entrance pathways are narrow so signposted 'Passing Points' have been installed to allow distancing to be maintained. The site is signposted throughout giving clear direction and reminder signage. Barriers have been installed at the entrance to Pay stations in the cabin and by the tree netting station to ensure a one-way system and social distancing are maintained. Pens are sanitised at the inside pay station and the card reader is disinfected after each use. Tags are only handled by the customer, there is no cross contact. Where you are already using PPE in your work activity to protect against non-COVID-19 risks, you should continue to do so. ! The government advise: When managing the risk of COVID-19, additional PPE beyond what you usually wear is not beneficial. This is because COVID-19 is a different type of risk to the risks you normally face in a workplace, and needs to be managed through social distancing, hygiene and fixed teams or partnering, not through the use of PPE. The role of PPE in providing additional protection is extremely limited. Face Coverings: We require staff to wear visors and face coverings in the inside Pay stations and café area and outside visors only. Visitors will be required to wear face coverings in the inside Pay station. A face covering or visor can be very simple and may be worn in enclosed spaces where social distancing isn't possible. It just needs to cover your mouth and nose. It is important to use them properly and wash your hands before putting them on and taking them off.	5	1	5

Where a worker has tested positive whilst not experiencing symptoms but develop symptoms during the isolation period, they should restart the 10-day isolation period from the day the symptoms developed. The company will assist the test and trace service by keeping a temporary record of your staff shift patterns for 21 days and assist NHS Test and Trace with requests for that data if needed. This could help contain clusters or outbreaks. The company will have a plan in case there is a COVID-19 outbreak. This plan nominates: Lynne Hallam to lead on contacting local Public Health teams. If there is more than one case of COVID-19 associated with your workplace, you should contact your local PHE health protection team to report the suspected outbreak: https://www.gov.uk/health-protection-team. The company recognises that should the local PHE health protection team declare an outbreak, you will be asked to record details of symptomatic staff and assist with identifying contacts.
